I want to thank everyone who attended the 4th Cabinet Meeting, those who voted in the District Elections, attended Lunch and the Spring Rally. Lion John had a lovely Necrology service to honor our Lions who have passed on during the past year, and 1VDGE Lisa had a fantastic Team building activity—who knew what could be built with marshmallows, spaghetti noodles and a butterfly-great job of bringing Lions and their ideas together!

Lion Ashley Grimm spoke on how important our continued support of Four Diamonds for research and the Book Drive for the patients and families are. She shared her and her family's personal experiences when dealing with Baby Sam's diagnosis and treatment. I don't think there was a dry eye in the house—I know mine weren't.

Then International Director Bob Lee from Honolulu Hawaii shared inspirational words of Lionism along with a few laughs. He and Lion Pam also presented gifts of coffee, bracelets and Origami Hawaiian Shirts for us to remember his visit. He installed Lion Ron Brown from Youngwood Lions as our newest Zone Chair for our District, and assisted PID Cindy and I in presenting LCIF Donor Pins, as well as a Melvin Jones Fellow to Lion Bob Mizikar From Mt Pleasant Twp Lions (LCIF Square winner), a Presidential Medal to Lion Ed McCormick from Greensburg-East Hempfield Lions, and also presented Lion Kim Mesher with a Presidential Certificate of Appreciation. Two reminders for all clubs:


- 1. Please get your Club's District Donations to PDG Bob Mesher as soon as possible.

Broom Chicken Pancake Ticket, anyone?

My personal priority as a Lion is service. It is what inspires and nurtures volunteerism, and is ironically self-serving: we want to help because it satisfies a need we all share to do good in the world.

When we Lions *fundraise* as a part of service, we sometimes know *exactly* where the proceeds will go. And sometimes we decide where to allocate funds at year's end. Fundraising helps us support the causes we support - a necessary "evil" to many. It's important to communicate fundraising efforts with care, because Lions are spending their valuable time and effort in exchange for fundraising dollars.

- 1. Volunteers need to know that their precious, limited time is being respected and used in a way that satisfies the desire to serve. Lions are no different. Ask your members what they feel is a productive use of their time, and what isn't. Bring it up.
- 2. Ideally, fundraisers have specific causes or entities they are designated to benefit. Use your fundraising campaigns to inform the public (and your members!) to build support around the issue(s) you are seeking to help. Take a minute with a ticket-buyer to share information. Make a flier that lets patrons know exactly what you are trying to accomplish. Post it prominently. Chat up your customers. Even when a fundraiser doesn't have one specific beneficiary, choose a theme hunger, diabetes, or disaster relief, for example, and designate the funds accordingly when the time comes. Make sure each broom, chicken, pancake, or ticket you sell has the mission tied to it somehow so that patrons know how they are supporting our good work.
- 3. **Always include an invitation** on tickets, flyers, posters, everything for patrons who might want to help by becoming a Lion. Some people are just waiting to be asked.
- 4. **Service comes in many forms.** Boots-on-the-ground disaster recovery or local clean-up efforts. Hosting community events like a drug take-back day, food drive, or educational event. Helping with a vision screening event at a school. Prepping for a Lions Club meeting or event. Helping to maintain a Lions Club space. Attending District functions and support meetings. And yes, working on fundraiser events. All of these (and more) represent a donation of precious **time.**
- 5. **Consider tallying hours of service on a poster as an incentive for your members.** Gold star! Awards can be simple, thoughtful acknowledgements. And remember serving your Lions Club and your Lions District is a form of that service, in whatever form it takes. If it weren't, I wouldn't be here.
- 6. **Report your service.** All of it, it's important. If you don't know how, find out. Share it with your community too sharing your service record publicly helps keep the ball rolling. It serves to improve your club's viability over time by **showing its relevance**.

I've always wondered how many people actually read these newsletter notes, and this one is much longer than I intended. I hope reading this has been of value and not a waste of time!


It was so exciting seeing everyone working together! Each table had very unique ideas!

Furthermore, encourage your newly elected officers to take the club officers training courses in the Lions Learning Center (LLC) to prepare for their term, OR, attend the district's Club Officer Training session. Of course, outgoing officers should mentor the newly elected officers and share the various E-Books to help make the transition easier.





Recruiting Tools - Your Lions Foundations



What do you tell people about when trying to recruit them as Lions? Hopefully you tell them about the service that your Club does and how you think they will be a good fit to that and future service. How about the larger picture? Do you tell them about what Lions are able to do because of our combined efforts? How together our efforts are able to serve more.

Our Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and our Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation (LOPF) are two tools and resources that are available to help our Lions efforts go even further. LCIF offers disaster and community improvement grants. The Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation offers matching grants for projects that Pennsylvania Lions are supporting in the state of Pennsylvania.

LCIF and LOPF - Empowering Lions

LCIF and the LOPF empowers Lions to improve the health and well-being of those in need through grants around the world. Donations to LCIF and to the LOPF go towards these grants. Some donations fund the service of all causes that the foundations support and others go specifically to disaster relief. These are projects that are impacted because of the combined efforts of our membership throughout the District, the state, and around the world.

LOPF Grants in District 14-E

This Lions Year we have had three grants applied to from the District and they went before the LOPF Board.

- A request for \$8,615 was approved for the Pediatric Cancer Project the District has been working on collecting books and purchasing Nintendo Switches. – Grant Approved.
- \$6,000 was requested for the District Care-A-Van to purchase two new vision screeners. The Kaleidos Screeners will allow the Care-A-Van to continue its mission of helping screen for vision problems. – Grant Approved.
- The District requested \$5,000 for water rescue gear to Tunnelton-Conemaugh Township Fire Department. – Grant

 Invite a community health professional to visit your club and educate members on the prevalence and impact of hunger in your community.

ACT // BEGINNER

- Support your local food bank by donating time, equipment or food.
- Create a resource list of hunger related volunteer opportunities in your region to share with other clubs in your district.
- Use social media to raise awareness about childhood hunger in your community and to inspire others to become involved.
- Host a healthy eating event at your school, community center or place of worship. Invite a nutritionist as a keynote speaker.
- Deliver nutritious, prepared meals to elderly, disabled or ill community members.
- Serve meals at a soup kitchen or homeless shelter.
- Donate to organizations that provide micro-nutrient powders to malnourished children.
- Bring a variety of fruits and vegetables to an elementary school class. Explain to the students where the food comes from and encourage them to taste different types of produce.

ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Volunteer with a "gleaning group" to harvest unpicked fruits and vegetables at farms and orchards.
- Host a grocery store or market tour where a nutritionist gives participants tips on choosing healthy and nutritious groceries.
- Collaborate with a food bank to organize a community food drive, focusing on collecting items most needed in your area.
- Write a cookbook of inexpensive, healthy, easy-to-make recipes.
- Work with your local school to provide weekend take-home bags of nutritious snacks for children in need
- Sponsor a cooking class for youth to learn basic cooking skills for healthy living.
- Create an online resource on planning and portioning meals to reduce household food waste.

ACT // ADVANCED

- Conduct an assessment of food access in your community.
 Advocate to local government leaders for additional or improved options in areas of need.
- Support pregnant women and new mothers by ensuring there are comfortable, safe and clean areas for them to nurse in the community.
- Use your professional networks to connect food banks to food industry leaders interested in food recovery.
- Develop a program to provide underserved students with food during holiday times when school is not in session.
- Establish a community or school vegetable garden for residents in a food-insecure neighborhood.
- Establish a weekly produce stand in a food desert.
- Create a volunteer transportation program to help individuals and families get to and from grocery stores, food banks and soup kitchens.
- Develop an animal husbandry program where a few families receive a small stock of animals. A portion of the animals' offspring will be given to neighboring families for sustainable growth of the program.

- Fill cards with best wishes and donate them to impacted families or a cancer center.
- Organize a group activity for patients, like reading books or playing games.



Reduce the prevalence of diabetes and improve quality of life for those living with diabetes.

- Develop a diabetes resource list by connecting with a local health department or hospital and share with your community.
- Organize a weekly walking club or <u>Strides</u> event to promote healthy living.



Relief

Meet immediate needs and provide long-term support for communities devastated by natural disasters.

- . Learn how to apply for Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) disaster grants.
- Connect with a local disaster relief organization and ask how your club can volunteer.



Protect the environment to create healthier communities and a more sustainable world.

- Clean a local area, like a park, roadside or beach.
- Hold a recycling drive to repurpose or donate gently used items.





Identify the world's most crucial needs and provide humanitarian aid where it's needed most.

- Visit those who are disabled or elderly living alone or in care homes.


