As we move into September, here are a couple things to consider.

- Prioritize your club's participation in PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp's "500 Club," where clubs donate \$5 per member toward maintenance costs at the Camp. When all our clubs participate, Westmoreland Lions will contribute more than \$3,000 toward this important need. Remember that "500 Club" participation doesn't take the place of other regular donations and annual support needed for Beacon Lodge.
- I'll be challenging every club to end the year with at least one more member than you started with. If we succeed, we'll surpass the lofty goal, requested by LCI, of a net gain of 26 new members this year. They're calling it MISSION: POSSIBLE!

Directories will be distributed soon, and a digital version will be made available on our website. Please excuse the delay brought on by the transition to the new Lions Portal. Special thanks go to Rostraver Township Lion Kim Mesher for her work on this important document.

#### First Vice District Governor Message...

Dear Fellow Lions:

As the "Dog days of summer" come to an end, the end of my August went to the dogs... Literally! Leader Dogs that is!

A perk of being a Vice District Governor is an exclusive invitiation to tour the facilities of Leader Dogs for the Blind located in Rochester Hills, Michagan. It is an opportunity to spend the weekend with other Vice District Governors throughout Pennsyslvania as well as meeting Lions from other districts. We

had Lions from as far south as Miami, north in Canada, and west from Washington state. Our group was one of the largest groups that Leader Dogs has seen in awhile coming in at 60+ lions.

During our visit, we spent that day at the facility where we were given a tour and overview of the campus. We had the opportunity to listen to stories by two of their clients who have benefited from the services provided by Leader Dogs for the Blind.

Throughout the day, we participated in various workshops and discussions, and it was through this experience that I gained a new way of seeing the world through the eyes of a blind person. And more importantly, I came home with a new appreciation for this organization, what they do, what they stand for and how we Lions make such a powerful contribution to this organization, not only through the money we help raise, but through our support and advocacy.

Leader Dogs give clients the tools and skills they need to successfully navigate and thrive in a sight-driven world. We give them hope and independence. Leader Dogs is 100% philanthropically funded which means that all the programs are available to clients at no cost. In addition to guide dogs, they have created their own Orientation and Mobility Program to teach and give their clients options, like how to use a white cane. During our visit, we VDGs had the opportunity to test our skills using a white cane and were given the chance to see what it is like to work with a guide dog. When we went back to the hotel, we participated in "Dinner in the Dark" where we all dined with blindfolds on.

And of course, the puppies! I can't forget to mention the puppies! And right now, there is a critical need in this area. There are incredible opportunities available for Lions to contribute to this program. Two in particular are through puppy sponsorship or becoming a puppy raiser. And currently, there is a demand, RIGHT NOW, for puppy raisers. You do not need to be a Lion to be a raiser. If you know somebody who is good with animals, loves dogs, and would make a great raiser, please let them know about this program!

And while I could go on for DAYS talking about Leader Dogs, Lion Amanda Remic is our District's Leader Dog Chairperson, and she would be more than happy to discuss with your club more information about this organization and answer any additional questions you may have.

Dear Lions and Leos,

Our 2024-2025 Lions Clubs International President is Fabricio Oliveira, from Brazil. His theme is "Make Your Mark." In order to accomplish this, we are being challenged to reach beyond our comfort zones to add and retain more members and clubs than ever before, not to boast about being the largest service organization, but **to provide more service**.

Just when you thought that we've exhausted all of our membership ideas, we realized that there are new ways to approach individuals and accomplish our goals, IF we ALL are open to learning. Recently, DG Jeff, PDG Tom, and I attended a Global Action Team Mission 1.5 Summit where I was a facilitator. During the two intensive days of learning from each other, we practiced different techniques for engaging potential members based on their interests, practicing conversational recruiting techniques, rather than the usual "Elevator Speech." We also learned about Asset Mapping and Asset Based Community Development to partner with local organizations, particularly libraries, scouts, and other non-profit groups.

After hearing a number of motivational Success Stories, every district shared their successes and challenges with other Global Action Team (GAT) Members from throughout the United States. The attendees then worked together with their district and multiple district GAT teams to revisit and refine the district goals, but it takes EVERYONE working together to accomplish the goals.

After all, membership is everyone's responsibility. In the past nine years, Constitutional Area 1 (CA1), the United States and the English-speaking islands of the Caribbean, have lost two Director positions due to CA1's membership losses during the past 45 years. Rumor has it that we may lose another two or three members in the near future. Perhaps this won't mean very much to your club members. However, Lions Clubs began here in the United States, and this is where our headquarters should remain. Likewise, do you REALLY want the other areas of the world to determine our policies? Each of our communities is different, but each depends on our Lions service. Without our help, even more individuals and families would struggle.

So, PLEASE reach out to other organizations and community members to help us make our communities more dynamic and viable because the future of Lionism in Westmoreland County and the United States depends on each of us. Let this be the year that we "Make Our Mark." Thank you for all that you do.

#### Greetings Fellow Lions!!


I made it to/from San Antonio for LCIF training safe and sound with no mishaps! During my training, I was informed that our District's donation goal is \$21,000 for this year. This is an average of \$30 per member. This can include District Donations, club donations and all individual direct donations made. When making a direct donation, please be sure to note your Club name and District so proper credit is given. I also have the new International President's Donor Pins for those who donate at the benchmark levels! There are many easy ways to give. If you need more information, please contact me or google Lions Clubs International Foundation and explore the options for yourselves.

I am looking forward to sharing Lions Clubs International Foundation with all of you and hopefully there is something you will be able to store in your memory banks for future use.

As you know, there are many grant opportunities available through LCIF. The most well-known is the Disaster Relief Grant. This grant helps restore everyday life for victims of natural disasters such as floods, tornadoes, hurricanes and fires, just to name a few. Just a few weeks ago, District G had several areas that experienced severe flooding as a result of Hurricane Debby. They applied for an Emergency Grant and were approved for \$10,000 very quickly and our District, along with others, also donated money to assist with their clean-up efforts. Other Disaster Grants include Preparedness Grants, Community Recovery Grants and Major Catastrophe Grants, and these are all made possible from our donations. Did you know that there are 25.3 million people displaced each year by disasters, over 12,000 lost lives from flooding, and 28,500 deaths from windstorms, tornadoes, cyclones, hurricanes, and wildfires? Therefore, it is imperative that we continue to give to LCIF so Lions can continue to help those in need.

Working together, I am certain we can reach these goals in order to improve the lives of those in need, so we can "Make Our Mark" in the World!!

# BRING SOMEONE TO THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Bring Someone was the idea introduced last year of bringing in new Members to Lionism. We will focus this uear on bringing in those Members to our Neighborhoods. While our Clubs are part of and Serve the Neighborhoods we are from, we will focus on those Clubs as Neighborhoods in themselves and the bonds we have as Lions.

#### Make Your Mark – There's a Leader Inside Every Lion



#### LEARN

- · Raise club awareness about childhood cancer by holding an educational talk with a healthcare professional or public health official at your club or district meeting or related events.
- · Collaborate with a local childhood cancer hospital or support home staff to learn about the needs of their patients and families. Brainstorm ways your club can address key challenges and gaps.
- · Research and develop a list of local childhood cancer organizations in your community to support future projects.
- Identify local advocacy events related to childhood cancer and explore ways to get involved.

#### ACT // BEGINNER

- · Identify nearby childhood cancer centers and support homes to request a wish or needs list. Conduct a drive to donate the requested items.
- · Prepare healthy meals for families with children undergoing treatment. This can be done in collaboration with other community members to ensure the family receives food on a regular basis.
- · Collect recyclable materials and donate the profits to a childhood cancer organization.
- · Write cards full of well-wishes and share them with a local cancer center.
- · Donate financial support or gift cards to identified families in need or a nearby childhood cancer center. This could cover expenses like gasoline, parking, food, medical expenses, etc.
- · Make or buy new hats, caps, head scarves or blankets to donate to childhood cancer centers.
- Volunteer at a local childhood cancer organization fundraising event.
- · Organize a community drive to assemble a toy library for the enjoyment of patients.
- · Participate in a blood donation or bone marrow registry event to benefit cancer treatment.

#### ACT // INTERMEDIATE

- Collaborate with an organization that makes wigs for children with cancer to collect and donate hair.
- Provide tutoring services to children with cancer, their siblings, or adult learning opportunities for parents.
- Organize an event with a cancer support center to have family photographs taken.
- Raise awareness of childhood cancer through informational pamphlet distribution, radio public service announcements, or social media campaigns.
- Provide children's entertainment at a local hospital or treatment center for children with cancer. Entertainment can include social visits to read books and play games, hosting a seasonal party, or spending time with siblings of patients.
- · Provide funding support for essential medicines and supportive services. Crucial medical needs could include chemotherapy supplies, nutritional supplements, medical equipment, essential staff, etc.
- Participate in a one-time volunteer activity at a childhood cancer camp.
- Organize a community childhood cancer awareness event such as a walk/run event or pamphlet distribution.

#### ACT // ADVANCED

- · Familiarize yourself with the bone marrow transplant registry. If one is not established in your country, determine what would be needed to create one.
- · Organize an advocacy event to impact government policy around childhood cancer.
- · Acquire and equip vehicles for the transportation of patients and family members for commuting to and from the hospital.
- Volunteer at established support housing facilities or develop a new one.
- · Make yarn character wigs (ex. Superhero, princess) for children with cancer.
- · Organize a workshop with medical specialists in child oncology for pediatric physicians, nurses, related medical personnel, or parents to train on early diagnosis of childhood cancer.
- · Organize a fun half-day retreat for families of children in remission or the siblings of children with cancer.
- · Furnish waiting rooms for the families and guests of children with cancer.
- Organize and facilitate an activity at a childhood cancer camp.
- Create mini-kitchens at hospitals or support homes for food preparation and supply with food.
- Organize a fundraiser for a childhood cancer organization, or for a local family who has been impacted by childhood cancer.

As we enter the fall season, September provides us with another opportunity to work on the Global Cause of Childhood Cancer. September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, and there are several projects that we can do to increase awareness of this terrible disease.

Holding a special fundraising activity with your club, or in conjunction with other civic organizations in your community. Go to the Four Diamonds Web Page and check out the "Play for the Kids" ideas. Many of the chain restaurants, as well as local restaurants, promote community involvement and charitable giving. If your club or district participates in "**Strike Out Childhood Cancer**," please send an e-mail with the amount raised to Four Diamonds to show how successful this type of project is.



In the U.S., more children die from cancer than any other disease. An estimated 16,000 children will be diagnosed with cancer this year, and approximately 1 in 5 children will not survive.







#### MISSION

ce 1993, the mission of LDBAW has been to provide funding and educational support for those with diabetes who seek financial assistance to pay for their diabetes medications and supplies through three hospitals' programs.

Charitable funds are generated through ongoing contributions from all Lions Clubs located in Allegheny and Westmoreland Counties, annual events, community fund drives and grant assistance applications to Lions Clubs International, as well as other local funders.

Financial support of fundraising projects is also provided by the UPMC Health System Foundation and the Westmoreland Hospital Foundation.

#### ORGANIZATION

LDBAW meets quarterly, and is comprised of voting, nonvoting, and reporting members.

- District Governors for Pennsylvania Lions
  Districts 14-8 Allegheny County and 14-E Westmoreland County (voting)
- · Five (5) board members per district, including each district's diabetes chairperson (voting)
- Two permanent board positions since the inception of the program in 1993 (voting)
- · Hospital presidents, diabetes program coordinators, and physician directors are invited to board meetings for medication education reporting only (non-voting)
- District First and Second Vice District Governors (non-voting).

#### WHAT WE DO

LDBAW maintains the Lions Diabetes Emergency Relief Fund. Funds may be disbursed for medications for diabetes patients who reside in Allegheny and Westmoreland Counties, who meet income guidelines, and are unable to afford the cost.

Funds are disbursed directly to the UPMC McKeesport, UPMC East, Independence Westmoreland Hospital Pharmacy, and Med-Fast Pharmacy on a monthly basis. Requests for support are managed and monitored by each hospital's diabetes program coordinator.



#### HOW TO APPLY

Applicants must be eligible based on total monthly/yearly income, monthly expenses, and medical need as determined by a physician.
