This was Fred Rogers' advice for how parents could reassure children when faced with a crisis or disaster, most famously shared by Rogers in the wake of the events of September 11, 2001.

Our own Lions International (LI) is known for its swift and effective disaster relief efforts. Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has been actively supporting communities affected by natural disasters, including Pennsylvania Lions District 14-G and the flooding caused by the aftermath of Hurricane Debby. In response, LCIF awarded a \$10,000 Emergency Flood Relief grant to help Lions in District 14-G provide immediate assistance. This grant is part of LCIF's broader effort to support disaster relief operations, which includes various stages from immediate response to long-term recovery. These grants

help meet essential needs such as food, water, clothing, and medical supplies, ensuring that aid reaches those in need quickly. The Lions' commitment to service and their ability to mobilize resources efficiently make them a vital part of disaster relief efforts.

While there isn't specific information available about LCI's response to Hurricane Helene, as of the writing of this note, it's highly likely that LCI and LCIF will be involved in providing aid, given the severity of damage along the Florida Gulf Coast and throughout the Southeastern US. LCI often works alongside other organizations to ensure that essential supplies, such as food, water, and medical aid, reach those in need. Please consider supporting LCIF Disaster Relief when you contribute to LCIF, whether through your club or individually (or both). It really will come back to benefit our area Lions when we need it most. We are helpers.

### Dear Lions,

### October is Medication Label Safety Awareness Month.



Of course, with our aging population, many of us are relying on more medications, and often have difficulty reading the labels. If you or a loved one has encountered this challenge, then ScripTalk is the solution for you. It is a **FREE**, easy-to-use service, available at thousands of pharmacies throughout the United States (and Canada) that will read your medication information aloud. These pharmacies include Wal-Mart, CVS, Target, and many others.

In the United States, the Food and Drug

Administration estimates that **1.3 million people suffer from medical errors each year**. Consequently, talking prescription labels are crucial to ensuring medication safety for those with diminished eyesight.

### How Does It Work?

A pharmacist programs a small electronic label with all of your prescription information, including the drug name, dosage, instructions, side effect warnings, pharmacy information, doctor's name, prescription number, date, and more. The tag relies on radio frequency identification and text-to-speech technology.

The pharmacist places the tag on your prescribed medication where you can use a free mobile ScripTalk App to hear your information read aloud, after downloading the App from the App Store or Google Play, Simply click the "scan" button while holding the bottle up to the front of the screen (iPhones) or on the back of the phone case near the camera (Androids). Click here to see how the App works.

Alternatively, you can use a ScripTalk Station, which is about the size of an old, portable CD player or phone messaging machine by placing the pill bottle on the machine and pressing the "Read" button. The two triangle buttons on either side of the oval "read" button can advance forward or rewind through the prescription information. Furthermore, there is a small wheel on the right side of the machine to turn it on and regulate the volume. Click here to learn how the ScripTalk Station works..




The Rostraver Township Lions Club, in partnership with the Belle Vernon Area School District, presented "Reading Under the Stars" on August 8 at the James Weir Stadium. Despite the rainy weather, many families attended and enjoyed the educational games, themed prize baskets of books, and eye screenings. Our goal was to provide books to all 1250 elementary school students, which was exceeded. Due to reduced costs from various book distributors, each child was able to select several books to add to their draw-stringed school bag that was donated by the school district and the school's PTA.

This project was an excellent opportunity for our Lions Club to partner with the school district, to reintroduce our Peace Poster contest, and to discuss ways to make this an annual event, with some modifications. Of course, we were extremely grateful to the Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation (LOPF) for awarding us a \$1250 grant to help offset the cost of the books. We also received a gift certificate from the Belle Vernon Wal-Mart and a generous monetary donation from the Fayette City-Washington Township Lions Club. In addition, the Rostraver Township Lions designated the June Barbeque as a fundraiser for this cause.

We also appreciated IPDG Amy and PDG Chuck Thompkins, and PDG Sam Snively for assisting our club members with the eye screenings to utilize our new Titmus eye screeners that were also acquired through an LOPF grant.

Plans are already underway for next year's "Reading Under the Stars" that will include an ageappropriate movie, along with various themed baskets, reading games, a variety of books for the children to select, as well as eye screenings, and a few surprises.

Westmoreland County Lions have been very fortunate to receive several LOPF grants this year. Of course, PDG Lance Remic, our Board representative has been instrumental in ensuring that our applications were complete and advocating for our causes. Thanks, PDG Lance.





So how were the Rostraver Twp Lions able to get a grant from the Lions of Pennsylvania Foundation? It begins with a well thought out plan and then an application. Westmoreland County Lions are also very lucky to have PDG Lance Remic as our Board representative who can assist clubs who may be interested in doing something similar or have an idea of their own for consideration. Did you know that over 820 million people in the world don't have enough food to eat? Did you know that 45% of children under the age of five die from nutrition related causes? Did you know that in the United States alone, one in nine people suffer from hunger? Did you know that Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) offers grants to Lions Districts ranging from \$10,000-\$100,000 to aid in eliminating Hunger?

### MISSION

Since 1993, the mission of LDBAW has been to provide funding and educational support for those with diabetes who seek financial assistance to pay for their diabetes medications and supplies through three hospitals' programs.

Charitable funds are generated through ongoing contributions from all Lions Clubs located in Allegheny and Westmoreland Counties, annual events, community fund drives and grant assistance applications to Lions Clubs International, as well as other local funders.

Financial support of fundraising projects is also provided by the UPMC Health System Foundation and the Westmoreland Hospital Foundation.

### **ORGANIZATION**

LDBAW meets quarterly, and is comprised of voting, nonvoting, and reporting members.

- District Governors for Pennsylvania Lions Districts 14-B Allegheny County and 14-E Westmoreland County (voting)
- Five (5) board members per district, including each district's diabetes chairperson (voting)
- Two permanent board positions since the inception of the program in 1993 (voting)
- Hospital presidents, diabetes program coordinators, and physician directors are invited to board meetings for medication an education reporting only (non-voting)

 District First and Second Vice District Governors (non-voting).

### WHAT WE DO

LDBAW maintains the Lions Diabetes Emergency Relief Fund. Funds may be disbursed for medications for diabetes patients who reside in Allegheny and Westmoreland Countles, who meet income guidelines, and are unable to afford the cost.

Funds are disbursed directly to the UPMC McKeesport, UPMC East, Independence Westmoreland Hospital Pharmacy, and Med-Fast Pharmacy on a monthly basis. Requests for support are managed and monitored by each hospital's diabetes program coordinator.



### **HOW TO APPLY**

Applicants must be eligible based on total monthly/yearly income, monthly expenses, and medical need as determined by a physician.
