Did you know that November is Diabetes Awareness Month? What does your Club do to support the Diabetes cause?

Recently, the Lions of Westmoreland and Allegheny Counties (Districts 14-E & 14-B) formed a new Diabetes Board. It is called the Lions Diabetes Board of Allegheny & Westmoreland Counties aka LBDAWC. It is made up of equal members from both Districts B & E. Lion Michele Matuch is our Chairperson, and PID Cindy Gregg is the Vice-Chair. Lions Ron Somers, Dave Long & IPDG Chuck Thompkins are on the board along with DG Margie Wolff, 1VDG Tony Catullo & myself along with representation from District 14-B and both McKeesport Hospital & Excela Health. Quarterly meetings are held to plan fundraising events and to receive updates on disbursements for medication costs and treatment.

By the time you read this newsletter, the Annual Diabetes Golf Outing will be over, and the planning has started for the Christmas Around the World Social event. The Board hosts these events to raise additional funds in order to continue the alliance with both hospitals so we can continue to provide monies needed to assist with payment for medications and treatment for those with Diabetes who cannot afford the costs. Disbursements from April –August totaled over \$10,000.00. With the costs of medications and treatments continuing to increase, the amount needed for assistance will also continue to grow. Therefore, it is very important to continue your support of the LDBAWC via District Donations or direct donations as they continue to work with UPMC & Excela Health to combat Diabetes. It is estimated that by the year 2025 that over 53.1 million people will be affected by this disease and that it will cost approximately a half trillion dollars to treat.

We—You, can help make a difference. For example, your club could hold a Strides walk and all funds raised could go to Diabetes. Or, you could hold a Diabetes clinic or screening in your community to raise awareness as there are many who are walking around undiagnosed. You could also have a presentation at your club provided by one of the hospital representatives. And, if you think only adults are affected by Diabetes, you are wrong. Many children are diagnosed with Juvenile Diabetes, so a service project around this could be to make Diabetic Kits and provide to your local schools.

This is why it is very important to continue to support the District's Diabetes Board, because you or someone you know my need our help in the future!!

As you are aware, IP Doug chose "Service from the Heart" as his theme, because passion and service is our gift to the world. Of course, **you**, the members, are the heartbeat that drives our association and our service.

Speaking of members, our Global Action Team and the Global Membership Champion have **prioritized four clubs** within our district that need some additional support. At one time, each of these clubs was extremely vibrant within their community, and we would like to revive that status. Consequently, within the next few weeks, our teams will be meeting with these clubs to determine their strengths, things that they would like to change, opportunities within the community, and obstacles that are affecting their club, and then to work with the officers and members to develop a plan to improve their situation.

While many other clubs are doing well, we can always do better. As we enter the final month of the first quarter of this Lions year, we need to assess our progress toward achieving the district goals. To help with that effort, consider sponsoring a member. After all, **membership** is EVERYONE's responsibility, and when you were inducted, you promised to bring a member who was interested in improving the community. While we fear being rejected, many people don't join because they have never been asked. Learn what excites these individuals and what improvements they would like to see in the community. Then, invite them to help you make some changes. Plan an event to share information with potential members to make them aware of ways in which you support your community. Don't be the "best kept secret in town."

Likewise, encourage those in your club who have the potential to become **leaders**, because leaders are made, not born! Encourage them to attend the **Fall Symposium** in Johnstown on October 17 or the **Regional Lions Leadership Institute**, March 11-13 in Harrisburg. Lions who have previously attended, are amazed to learn what is available and want to do more! Furthermore, inspire them to take courses in our **Lions Learning Center** or at Lions University. These are free courses that can be done at your convenience, and some members who have completed these courses received job promotions or a raise in pay, by producing the certificate at the completion of the course.


Of course, **report your service** to provide an accurate measure of what your club does. This may provide other clubs with some ideas or encourage them to offer new services in their area.

Are you communicating with your members so that they are aware of meetings, projects, and fund raisers? Do you mentor new members? Are there opportunities for members to want to be involved? Do you recognize birthdays, anniversaries, and special events so that your members feel like extended family? Are your meetings and service projects interesting, or are they "the same old projects" that you've always done? Try something different. LCI has **Project** ideas and **Planners** on the LCI website that are extremely detailed so that you don't need to reinvent the wheel. Furthermore, think about partnering with Leos or other organizations to provide larger projects or fundraisers.

Finally, with all of the disasters that are occurring throughout our country and the world, think about making a donation to **LCIF**, particularly to Campaign 100. After all, 14-E has been the recipient of several LCIF grants. Recently, we received \$10,000 to help furnish Covid supplies in Westmoreland County. Your individual donation doesn't need to be huge: \$5, \$10, or \$25 from every Lion, especially Melvin Jones Fellows, would be greatly appreciated. While we are proud to say that "every cent that is contributed to our Foundation goes to help individuals," only 6% of our global membership actually supports this cause. But there are other general classes as well on many topics like effective teams, conflict resolution, decision making, goal setting, and many others. Club President's Roundtable. We encourage all club presidents to join us for this interactive call. You will all receive emailed invitations. Membership

As we enter the month of September, our membership stands at 798. This as we know, is well below the LCI mandated 1250 members, but we are at a (+ 9) members year to date which is a step in the right direction. We are not alone; most volunteer organizations are experiencing declines in membership. We need to create new strategies to overcome the obstacles encountered when recruiting members. Society has dramatically changed in the years since a majority of us became Lions members. The family structure now includes single parent households or those where both parents hold full time jobs, women have now moved beyond being "stay at home moms" and entered the work force and in some cases, are now the family's primary source of income. Economic conditions have caused many to lose their jobs entirely or have forced them to work multiple part-time jobs to make ends meet. Families with children are forced to juggle hectic schedules to accommodate their involvement in sports, extracurricular school activities, dance, or a multitude of other time-consuming items. In addition, involvement in church groups, choirs, golf, softball, and bowling leagues, along with other volunteer commitments, all put a strain on our most valuable personal assets, our time and our treasures.

We need to be both progressive and flexible in embracing these lifestyle changes when recruiting new members. Our future lies in welcoming women, young adults, and families with children into our Clubs. We can no longer expect 100% participation at all Club meetings, service projects, or fundraising events. We must be grateful for whatever time an individual has to offer and thank them for their contributions. When collecting our International, State, District, and Club dues, we must realize that for some individuals, making a lump sum payment would put a huge strain on their finances and may be a deterrent to becoming a member. Why not setup a spreadsheet and let them make installment payments that fall within their budget constraints? With so many opportunities available to volunteer that don't require a monetary commitment, we need to promote our organization and Clubs for all that we do for our communities and those less fortunate than ourselves and convince them that the services we provide would, in most cases, not be available if we didn't exist.

People are motivated to serve for a variety of reasons. They are most inclined to serve if they can personally relate to a specific cause. If we promote the Lions for our contributions to our local community projects, Diabetes, Hearing, and Eye research, as well as, our Measles Initiative and other humanitarian projects, someone who has a friend or family member that suffers from diabetes, hearing loss, eye problems, or other ailments, may be inclined to join for these reasons. Our ability to determine what an individual is passionate about will be instrumental in acquiring, not only a new member, but also an active member. The power of our Lions motto "We Serve" is strengthened each time we add a new member.

Increase Membership with the Pennsylvania Plan

Overcoming the challenges of membership recruitment has been found to be difficult for individual Lions clubsto the point that many have asked for a step by step process for recruiting members. The Pennsylvania Plan issuch a process. It has been successful in the past, is currently successful and can be successful in the future.

- 1. The club should appoint a strong membership chairperson and a minimum of 2 Lions to serve on the club's membership Committee.
- 2. The club chooses a time period for its special membership recruitment program. The time should not exceed 60 days.
- 3. Once the time period has been set, the club should concentrate on the membership program. At the club's first planning meeting, the chairperson distributes the prospect list sheets. He / she then takes one category at a time on the prospect list sheet and asks each lion to put down as many names of prospects as they can think of for that category. Prospect list is church, work, clubs, neighborhoods, golfers, sports team coaches, teachers, doctors, lawyers, people from restaurants, Welcome Wagon lists, even a telephone book, and especially new members of the community. The chairperson emphasizes that by listing a name does not mean that club member will necessarily be the recruiter ofthat prospect.

The Chairperson reemphasizes that this is just the development of a potential prospect list. If this is done in each of the categories, and done well, the club should have names of many future Lions. The chairperson reminds the Lions not to eliminate any prospective names because they think the person won't join. Other members may have more influence.

- 4. At this point the chairperson gathers the prospect list sheets, eliminates duplicates, puts the names in alphabetical order on a master list and has copies made for the next meeting, so that every Lion has acopy of the list.
- 5. At the 2nd planning meeting of the club, the master prospect list is distributed, by the chairperson, so that the entire club may review the list of names submitted. The membership can exercise its right to accept the list or reject any of the names **before** they are ever approached. Once this process is finished, the chairperson starts down the list of names trying to find out who will take that particular name to contact and attempt to recruit that prospect as a Lion. The very important item to remember is that names are never assigned to the club members. The chairperson asks that the club member who believes that he has the best shot at recruiting the prospect is the one to take the name. Unless you have an exceptional Lion, <u>it is recommended</u> that individual club members take no more than five prospects.


If after all names have been reviewed and there are names remaining, these names can be kept for future membership consideration, throughout the year. Do not try to get rid of names just to get rid of them.

Also at this meeting the club members will decide what type of special membership meeting they will have. Membership Social, Special Club meeting, Friendship Day, Wine and cheese, etc... The club shouldset a date, time, and place for this special membership meeting, develop and agenda and determine presenters. Presenters should get a small Bio of the perspective member, no more than 5 or 6 facts.

6. The chairman prepares a letter inviting the prospects to the special meeting and presents copies to the club members at the 3rd planning meeting. He / she also includes copies of the agenda and club brochure. The chairperson emphasizes that the Lion who will contact the prospect and that the letter should be followed up by a personal phone call within 7 days of the mailing The contact Lion should encourage ma positive response from the prospect and even offer to bring the prospective member tothe special membership meeting. The contact Lion should not try to sell Lionism.

- 7. The 4th planning meeting of the club is report night. The membership reviews the original list of prospects one at a time and asks the contact Lion the results of their contact. At the conclusion of thisprocess, the club prepares for the special meeting by reviewing presentations, meal or snacks and howto make prospects welcome and comfortable.
- 8. Sometime during the special meeting applications should be given to the prospects and the prospects should be invited to the next regularly scheduled meeting of the club.
- 9. The next regular membership meeting should be a well planed event. There should be a organized opening, an active (but not overzealous) Tail twister, lots of fun, a brief discussion of club activities avery spirited presentation by a Lion that can motivate the prospects into the spirit of Lionism. (longwinded can equal boring).
- 10. Hold an impressive ceremony. Induction night should be well organized procedural event with the spirit of Lionism. All of the necessary supplies should be available, i.e. new membership kits, universalLions emblems, membership certificates signed by the president and sponsor. Whatever induction procedure the club desires can be used.

Following these ten steps can help a club renew itself by gaining new members to continue the work and traditions of Lionism.



- Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest in a local school or organized, sponsored youth group, such as YMCA programs, Boys & Girls Clubs, Scouts, etc. NOTE: The contest cannot be held in youth groups that a Lions club sponsors, such as a Leo Club or Scout unit. However, individual members of those groups (such as Leos or Scouts) may participate if the contest is held at their schools or other organized youth groups.
- The contest is open students who will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age.
- Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches. Do not mat
 or frame artwork.
- only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student.
- All artwork must be the individual student's original creation. Duplications are not accepted. All media are
 accepted. Note: Chalk, charcoal and pastel entries should be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do
 not laminate entries.
- Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork any way.
- The use of lettering or numbering in front of the poster, in any language, is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster.
- Artwork should be done on a flexible material so it can be rolled for shipping in a mailing tube. Do not fold poster.

Voting for the peace poster will be held at the next cabinet meeting in November.

CABINET MEETING AUGUST 14, 2021

BEACON LODGE REPORT

The July Board of Directors meeting was held at the Camp on July 27. Camp Director Jonathan reported that, because of COVID and recommendations by the CDC and Dept. of Health, a virtual camp program was created. In order to provide the Virtual Campers with the best experience possible, the Stone Creek Valley Lions sponsored a grant request to the North East PA Lions Service Foundation and received a \$30,000 grant to help defray the cost of the virtual meeting equipment used to implement the program. He noted that the number of campers has been decreasing over the past 10 years, especially in

the Children's Village. That decrease, coupled with the reduced number of employees, has resulted in having to rely on investments to supplement the operating budget. Project New Hope had 2 retreats scheduled and this year's attendance numbers have increased.

2 new Directors were approved from 14-U. A Director from 14-C has been nominated and is awaiting approval. Their willingness to serve is appreciated.

A new investment policy was proposed by the Finance Committee and will be voted on at the next meeting. Donations from the clubs and Districts is very poor. Please continue to spread the word about Beacon Lodge at your meetings. Remember – this is YOUR camp!!!

Property chair Charlie Finney reported that several Capital Improvement projects had been completed, with several to be finished in 2022.

The VDG seminar was held in conjunction with opening day of the Blind/Visually Impaired Camp. Twelve Districts were represented by 24 Lions. The Seminar included a tour of the Camp, briefings by the Executive Director and 1 VP Estella, lunch with the Board members and an opportunity to attend the Board meeting. The program was well received by all in attendance.

"500 Club" donations from District 14-E from Oct. 1, 2020 through July 16, 2021 totaled \$1,100 from only 8 clubs. Please encourage your members to contribute to this program, which helps with general camp expenses.


